### Post Office closure

### Kunsan driving privileges

E-6s and below are no longer allowed to keep a privately owned vehicle license unless they meet specific requirements and are supported by their commander, according to a recent policy by 7th Air Force and USFK. According to the policy, this applies to POVs, rental cars, and any other non-government vehicle. Personnel with a GOV driving permit may continue to drive GOVs on and off base if annotated. ## CES readiness creates new plotting program

Three members of the 8th Civil Engineer Squadron Readiness Flight recently put their talents together and created a single program to plot chemical attacks, reducing the amount of time planners need to accomplish their task. It also reduces the number of errors produced and enables commanders to make decisions more quickly.

When a chemical attack occurs during an exercise, it's the responsibility of readiness troops to plot the attack and provide commanders with data showing areas of the base affected by the attack, said Tech. Sgt. Edward

Jones, one the 8th CES members responsible for creating the new program. The old system took too much time, but also limited the number of people able to access the information.

"We took an existing product and process, streamlined and improved it, allowing lifesaving information to get to the installation commander faster, so risk assessments can be made very easy and fast," Sergeant Jones said.

The three programs used are VLS Track, which is a computer modeling software package, VLS Utilities, which is a program that scales the computer model for use on a map, and Power Point, the industry standard for visual display.

Sergeant Jones is a self-described

"Power Point commando" and led the effort to improve the system. Assisting in the creative effort were Staff Sgts. Kelly Blessing and Cornelius Gilmore. Sergeant Blessing has a great deal of experience with the VLS tracking and plotting systems and is also the training representative for the new product. Sergeant Gilmore's expertise is in computer modeling. He understood the fundamentals of the system and detailed the intensity and concentration rings of the plumes themselves. He builds the plumes using data from weather conditions, wind speeds and type of weapon to create the plumes.

## Promotion board convenes earlier for senior NCOs

The sergeant first class promotion board will be held three months earlier than scheduled, and selected noncommissioned officers will start pinning on rank in February, officials said.

The promotion board was first scheduled for February, but was changed to November. The master sergeant promotion board will be held one month earlier in September instead of the originally scheduled start of October.

Convening the boards ahead of schedule ensures the Army has the right number of Soldiers in these ranks as it fights the Global War on Terrorism, said officials from the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, G1.

The fiscal year 2003 sergeant first class board selected enough NCOs to meet the promotion needs for a 19-month period.

"However, the current list will be exhausted earlier than anticipated, and if we don't react, it will cause a drop in readiness," said Sgt. Maj. Gerald Purcell, the Directorate Military Personnel Policy, G1 sergeant major.

Soldiers should go to the Human Resources Command Web site at [www.hrc.army.mil](http://www.hrc.army.mil) to make sure their official military file is accurate, said Master Sgt. Fred Liggett, the G1 personnel policy integrator.

"Soldiers shouldn't wait for the military personnel message to come out," Sergeant Liggett said. "Most Soldiers know that they are in the zone. They can go online and check photos, awards and evaluation reports."

The deadline to update information for noncommissioned officers who are in the zone for promotion to master sergeant is Aug. 20. The deadline for those eligible for promotion to sergeant first class will be announced in a MILPER message tentatively scheduled for release in July.

The Enlisted Record and Evaluation Center will notify all Soldiers eligible for promotion consideration through their Army Knowledge Online e-mail account.

Current Army policy requires Soldiers being

considered for either master sergeant or sergeant first class be graduates of the Advanced Noncommissioned Officer Course or the Basic Noncommissioned Officer Course respectively. However, Headquarters department of the Army waivers will be given for those who are unable to complete the requisite course because Human Resources Command has not scheduled them to attend school, or because of a deployment, officials said.

"This is the right thing to do," Sergeant Major Purcell said. "This takes care of any Soldier, who because of Army requirements, and through no fault of their own, is unable to get to school. We will make sure that they are not denied promotion opportunities that they are entitled to."

The waivers will be issued from HRC, Sergeant Major Purcell said, and Soldiers don't need to take any action.

He emphasized the waivers allow Soldiers to be considered for promotion, but does not waive attendance at Noncommissioned Officer Education System schools. The requirement to complete and graduate from the course is still there, he said.

"It will catch up with them eventually if they don't get it (NCOES) done," Sergeant Major Purcell said. "All Soldiers need to do their best to get scheduled into their NCOES course as soon as it's practical and that it's for their own benefit in terms of professional development."

## Common sense key to safety

WASHINGTON — Air Force officials want Airmen to use common sense and not fall victim to accidents during the "101 Critical Days of Summer."

These 101 days fall between Memorial Day and Labor Day. This is the time period when the Air Force sees a rise in off-duty injuries caused by increased activity and risk taking, said officials from the Air Force Safety Center at Kirtland Air Force Base, N.M.

"Historically, this is a period of high risk, because people are doing more," said Herm Dean, the center's chief of ground safety operations. "People are outside traveling, swimming, camping — doing the things they've wanted to do all winter."

Unfortunately, Airmen are not always prepared to charge into summer activities. The safety campaign aims at drawing attention to safety awareness and risk management, especially on the road.

An average of 25 Airmen died during the summer months over the past five years, safety officials said. Most of these losses occurred in personal motor vehicle accidents, including motorcycles. These accidents are largely preventable.

"Know your limits and use personal-risk management," Mr. Dean said. "Don't try to drive 10 to 12 hours a day. Plan your trips. Don't take unnecessary risks."

Mr. Dean also offered other advice while traveling this summer:

- ◆Wear seatbelts
- ◆Remain alert while at the wheel, and plan breaks at frequent intervals.
- ◆Do not speed to arrive early. It is better to arrive late than not arrive at all.
- ◆Do not drink alcohol and drive.
- ◆Anticipate the unexpected and be ready to react.

He suggests using a simple three-step process — A-C-T.

"Assess the risk; consider your options; take appropriate action," Mr. Dean said. "It's easy, like crossing the street. You would never cross without looking left and right first."

"If what you're about to do is dumb, different or dangerous, then maybe it's too risky and you shouldn't be doing it," he said.

"This pretty much makes everybody's job easier, because you can go to split MOPP faster," said Sergeant Blessing. "You can also get out and accomplish the mission faster. Not only that, but people who check the M-8 stands jobs are easier too, because we can limit the areas the hazards are in."

Another advantage of the new program is that everyone already has the software programs needed and the time required to train people is virtually zero because of a checklist designed by the team, said Sergeant Jones.

"Everyone already knows how to use the different programs," he said. "What we have offered is a way to make all three work together."

This system was recently presented to a group of PACAF and Air Force civil engineers attending a conference in Hawaii and is being looked at for use throughout PACAF. Also, engineers from the Air Force Civil Engineer Support Agency at Tyndall Air Force Base, Fla., took a copy of the program back for review and possible use throughout the Air Force.

# Q & A: Meet 'Wolf Chief'

*\*Editor's Note: Chief Master Sgt. Chuck Talley became Kunsan's Wolf Chief Monday. The Wolf Pack Warrior recently had an opportunity to sit down with Chief Talley and find out a little about who he is; what his goals are for the enlisted corps here; and what he's all about.*

**Wolf Pack Warrior:** What was your first impression of Kunsan and the Wolf Pack?

**Chief Master Sgt. Chuck Talley, 8th Fighter Wing command chief master sergeant:** I was very impressed. The greeting I received from the Wolf Pack was better than I ever imagined. I had always heard

it was good, but it was even better than I had thought. In my career, I have always tried to get here because this is the only base where esprit de corps transcends the whole Air Force — once you're a Wolf Pack member, you're always a Wolf Pack member. That's not true for very many wings in the Air Force.

**WPW:** What is your leadership philosophy?

**Chief Talley:** If we take care of the troops, they'll take care of the mission. The biggest thing is we need to make sure we are listening and staying in tune with their needs. If we make sure we take care of everybody the best we can, and stay professional, the mission will be taken care of by the troops. As a chief we always try to remember where we came from and give back, so we must make sure we stay focused for the young troops.

**WPW:** What do you want to be able to do for the enlisted corps of the Wolf Pack? Any goals?

**Chief Talley:** I want to come in and serve with them and make sure we improve the quality of life during the time Col. (William) Uhle, (8th Fighter Wing commander), and I are here as much as we can within the limitations of the dollars. Stay mission focused. There are a lot of infrastructure issues that need our concentrated efforts to improve, even though we don't have the dollars to build everything new. So figure out what those quality of life issues are to help the youngsters. I'd love to say we will be down to single occupancy rooms by the time I leave, but we all know that's not true. I just want it to be a little better by the time I leave next year. Since I was a first sergeant for nine years and have been a command chief master sergeant now for four years, mentoring just comes with the business. I mean, you grab two or three troops every day, spend 10 or 15 minutes with them, or in little forums of 10 to 12 and just talk through things like "What do you want to be when you grow up?" or "What are your career goals?" And even if they are planning to leave the service, its important that they progress while they wear the uniform. The main thing is to grow the future master sergeants and senior master sergeants and chief master sergeants of tomorrow so comfortably we know the people and the mission will be taken care of.

**WPW:** Is there anything else you'd like to add?

**Chief Talley:** Just that I promise them that I will support the enlisted corps as best I can while I am here. I will give them all my energy and my attention to make sure that we progress and become the best enlisted corps we can be as we serve this mission.

## RUN FASTER

5 ways to increase stride length and run faster

◆ **Boot camp hills.** Find a steep hill that's at least 50 to 75 meters long, and run hill repeats on it once every two weeks. Alternate running up the hill at close to top speed with "bounding" up the hill more slowly, with an exaggerated vertical motion. Start with six repeats per workout and gradually increase to 10. Between repeats, jog slowly back down to the bottom of the hill.

◆ **Hill hops.** After you've finished the above workout, begin hopping up the hill on one foot for 15 hops, then shift to the other foot for 15 more hops. Walk for a few seconds to recover, and then repeat.

◆ **Hill fartlek.** Every 10 days or so, warm up by jogging for 10 minutes, then run for 30 continuous minutes over the most rolling terrain you can find. Accelerate on all uphill and jog easily on the downslopes. Try to maintain an overall effort level that's slightly less intense than a 10-K race.

◆ **Quick hops.** Once or twice a week, in the middle of your regular workouts, bound from foot to foot for about 30 meters at a time. Try to maximize your "air time" while minimizing the amount of time each foot spends on the ground. In other words, push hard and fast with the contact foot. Make sure that you cover more distance with these bounds than you do with your normal strides.

◆ **Running on your toes.** After you have warmed up properly, "sprint" on your toes for 30 meters, taking small, quick steps with high knee action. Jog easily for 15 seconds to recover, and then repeat twice more. When finished, do the rest of your workout.

Members of the Kunsan Fire Protection Flight completed an Indirect Fire Attack, cooling super-heated gases May 21. This allowed firefighters to position themselves closer to the fire in order to safely attack and extinguish the flames with appropriate water streams aimed at the heart of the "Dragon," or fire. The temperature reached 1006 degrees Fahrenheit at ceiling level. Incorrect fire stream application can result in the spread of flames to uninvolved areas causing severe injuries and possibly death to anyone inside the structure, to include firefighters. The benefits provided by the live-fire trainer are unique in that it allows firefighters to hone their skills, practice hose line deployment, command and control, and tactics and strategies, in a controlled environment that provides flames, heat, and other conditions that may be encountered at a real-world, structural fire emergency.
